



Equipping to Multiply



ECHO's East Africa trainers connect with family farmers through community group and school trainings, radio broadcasts, agricultural fairs, and farmer field schools.

When borders closed due to COVID-19 restrictions, trainers took another look at communities within Arusha City and saw existing groups that would benefit from and multiply ECHO knowledge. Youth committees, savings cooperatives, womens' groups, and secondary schools learned about the nutrients available in perennial vegetables and the benefits of urban gardens.

"For me, this training has been an eye-opening experience. I am thankful that the training has come just right in time when we need it most," shared Mama Abdul from Arusha.

Creating Future Incomes

Appropriate technology and creative capacity building have equipped innovators to solve problems in their own villages leading to the creation of ongoing small businesses and custom, innovative farm implements.

Healthy Hillsides Support Healthy Crops

Tree seedlings and contour ditches in hillsides are investments in a healthy future!

The team in East Africa has helped farmers cooperatively dig thousands of meters of erosion control contours and planted more than 24,000 indigenous seedlings to conserve precious hillsides. These hills are at risk of severe erosion leading to decreased soil nutrients and agricultural loss.

Planting Seeds of Hope

Seed Banks Across Asia

Assembling a growing body of knowledge related to appropriate seed storage practices and techniques over the years, ECHO is inspiring and equipping local seed banks to multiply and provide seeds to their communities.

After planting the seeds provided by an ECHO partner seed bank, Mr. Phin has a more than adequate food supply for his family and he has also been able to sell some vegetables to his neighbors. He found that by planting a variety of crops, he has enough food for his family while also creating a second source of income. Many of his neighbors have followed his lead and have planted vegetable gardens in their homes as well.

Backyard Gardens Take Root

In July of 2020, Pastor Nipon was able to travel from his home in Mae Hong Son province and attend a training at the ECHO Asia Demonstration Farm. Along with several other pastors, he learned about basic natural farming practices such as harvesting and using indigenous microorganisms and making fermented bio liquids. He also learned grafting techniques and the key principles of seed saving. He returned home with new ideas and a fistful of seed packages.

In the year since, these seeds have taken root as Pastor Nipon and his wife have built and maintained a home garden. As COVID has made access to food in the village unreliable, this garden has proven to be essential.

Equipping Young People to Help Themselves

Puk had gone to the city to look for work as a laborer, but when jobs dried up, he returned to his home village in Northern Thailand where farming could be his livelihood. Through ECHO resourcing and connections, Puk was able to create a cooperative farm with other underemployed youth and connect with a small business who agreed to purchase their harvests. This group of young people who couldn't find work in the city have returned home to abundant livelihoods.

ECHO Asia sent 4,517 seed packets across Asia to people like Pastor Nipon last year.

One trainee, Virak, shared a desire to be a light in a rural part of the country, an area very much in need of the gospel. Realizing quickly that as many as 80% of the people in the area were farmers, Virak points out that "Jesus spoke the language of the farmer, and to reach them, I should too".



Madame Traoré, a pastor's wife, learned about tomato paste and above-ground gardening and is helping her family and neighbors improve their nutrition.

Today, she trains women in her community and sells her tomato paste throughout the western region of Burkina Faso. She also shares the gospel to those she trains. Her income has increased, and she is happy to contribute to the development of women.

We will no longer lose any tomatoes. When there are too many, we can make tomato paste to sell to our neighbors and earn an income!

Hands-On Outreach

Life-changing Trainings

Terrorism, extreme weather, poverty, and historically poor land management leave West African farmers at a constant disadvantage.

However, in the midst of these trials, hope is shining through!

ECHO West Africa training teams have equipped over 3,392 men and women with practical agricultural skills that they can implement immediately to greatly improve harvests.

Internally displaced people groups, living in temporary camps and in desperate need, are being equipped with gardening skills to grow food in small spaces.

From Failing to Successful Gardens

ECHO recently partnered with a local NGO to provide 10-day trainings for 564 people. These trainings in market gardening techniques and entrepreneurship are helping families improve their gardening production and boost their incomes.

Abigaelle Kini was one of the women trained. She and her husband have a small plot of land that they were farming, but they kept trying and failing, never quite knowing how to make it successful.

"After the training with ECHO, I learned how to make natural products to eradicate the worms from my garden," said Abigaelle. "My husband and I are teaching our children all that we have learned."

ECHO Florida



Serving our Local Community

Like the rest of ECHO's teams around the world, ECHO Florida made some strategic "pivots" to extend its services and impacts during 2021.

Developing Cross-Cultural Mission-Minded Leaders

ECHO has begun a new partnership with Dallas International University (DIU) to develop its Intern Program into a fully-accredited Master's-level Certificate Program. While retaining the core hands-on, experiential training of ECHO's long-standing internship, key DIU courses have been added that will significantly enhance the understanding and capacity of our Interns to serve cross-culturally.



Pandemic realities inspired a dramatic increase in gardening and planting in Southwest Florida. ECHO's Seed Bank was able to respond with specially-selected "seed bundles" of desirable and reliable food plants, and ECHO's Propagation staff increased the grow-out of perennial vegetables and grafted fruit trees to meet high market demand while also raising support for ECHO's global mission.



Distributing Fresh Fruits and Vegetables

Early in the pandemic period, as concerns grew about increasing unemployment and hunger in ECHO Florida's "backyard", ECHO expanded its plantings of nutritious vegetables. During the year, over 7,727 lbs of donated fruits and vegetables were distributed to people in need in Southwest Florida.

ECHO supported 25 schools, churches, and nonprofits in Florida with community garden assistance last year.

Reaching Virtually

Live-Online Trainings

The global resourcing of missionaries and development workers is key to ECHO's mission. In 2020, we offered our first Virtual Appropriate Technology Fair and held the International Agriculture Conference in a new online format. Participants from 75 countries came together, learning valuable skills to help families and communities overcome the challenges they face on a daily basis.

The virtual trainings included breakout sessions and panel discussions, allowing attendees to choose topics relevant to the challenges they experience in the communities where they serve.

ECHOcommunity Growth

During COVID lockdowns, usage of the platform has increased dramatically. In March of 2020, use of ECHOcommunity had

increased 100% over the previous year. By April 30th, usage had increased 270% over the previous year. This means more development workers and missionaries than ever before are finding the resources they need to improve their agricultural practices whereever they serve.

Launched Mobile App

The ECHOcommunity mobile app, launched in November 2020, is helping to deliver valuable resources to farmers in their fields even without internet access. In the app, users can curate which resources to save and share with offline access, create seed trial reports, and explore plants.







LEVERAGING THE PAST TO SHAPE THE FUTURE: CEO TRANSITION



In July of 2021, ECHO's President/CEO David Erickson asked the Board to begin the process of identifying his successor. The goal is to inaugurate the new President/CEO in February 2022.

David has recovered well from prostate cancer surgery, but believes that this is the time to invite new leadership for all that God has in store for ECHO's next decade. As the Search Committee has embarked on identifying ECHO's next leader, one of the most important steps in a process of this kind is to understand the opportunities, challenges, and needs of ECHO from those who are most deeply connected with its mission.

The committee has developed search and selection criteria, a President/CEO position profile, and a search and outreach plan. The invitation for applications, screening, interviewing will take place in late 2021. Both David and the Board have committed to take whatever time is necessary to find the next leader to advance ECHO's work and witness into the future.
