ECHO's Global **Reach**

Around the world, small-scale farmers work hard to produce enough food for their families and communities. However, among the 1 in 9 people who are chronically hungry, an estimated 70% rely on small-scale agriculture for their livelihoods. For more than 40 years, ECHO has worked with a diverse network to equip these farmers with agricultural skills – through training and resourcing – that improve crop production and raise families out of hunger and poverty.

Many of the attempts to increase global crop production in recent decades have led to land degradation, rising debt, reduced biodiversity, and decreased soil fertility, exacerbating small-scale farmers' vulnerability. The benefits of providing relevant training to male and female farmers go far beyond the individual – to healthier children, more education, and greater investment in the community. Last year, 40% of ECHO trainees were women. This year ECHO equipped even more women – 49% of all trainees – with the skills, knowledge, and resources in sustainable agriculture and appropriate technologies that will result in increased farm yields, nutrition, and income.

Your partnership with ECHO restores depleted soils, reduces erosion, uses low-cost materials, increases biodiversity, and builds resilience so families can know true *Hope Against Hunger*.

Clearly, there is much more to be done!







In Guelwongo, Burkina Faso, 125 participants including 52 women and 73 men participated in an ECHO training. They were inspired by the innovative and practical aspect of what they learned. The day after the training, the local pastor's wife started collecting neem seeds to extract the oil. "This technique is a great discovery for me and I intend to sell the neem oil," she told us, proudly carrying her basin of neem seeds on her head.

TAILORED VIDEO TRAININGS

While COVID precautions affected all of our teams around the world, it was most felt by our Southeast Asia team. Restrictions on groups of any size continued into 2022. Adapting to these constraints, the passionate team completed research and demonstration projects at the Small Farm Resource Center and then published more than 50 hours of tailored training resources in multiple languages for network partners to share in their communities.

IN-PERSON OPPORTUNITIES MULTIPLY

As the opportunities to resume inperson trainings renewed, ECHO Asia conducted workshops on the System of Rice Intensification, On-Farm Feeds, Biosand Water Filtration, Seed

KNOWLEDGE ACROSS BORDERS

Since the recent renewal of these inperson trainings at ECHO Asia, one trainee, Miss Thabley, attended her first training, and was so enthused that she came back for several workshops. She has implemented the techniques

she learned in a jungle school and several villages inside Myanmar. She shared ECHO seeds with the jungle school students, and they planted the seed to produce nutritious vegetables and fruit at the school.

MEETING URGENT NEEDS

Since a military coup in February 2021, the number of Internally Displaced Peoples (IDPs) has skyrocketed in Myanmar and along the Thai border. With thousands of IDPs lacking access to clean water, ECHO Asia created hours of educational training related to low-technology water treatment appropriate for these settings.

In a biosand water filtration system, water moves by gravity and is treated using three unique barrels of gravel, sand, and charcoal. This process filters out physical, biological, and chemical contaminants and stores clean water in a fourth barrel. Trainees have now installed these systems in villages and schools meeting immediate clean water needs of many communities, and showing the power of information to cross borders and bless many people!

PLANTING A NEW INCOME

Ruben Ngao was the first farmer in Arusha, Tanzania, to work alongside the ECHO team to provide his input on the innovation of the Maresha planter. Developed over four years with local farmer feedback and support, it is now being produced by a local manufacturer in Tanzania. Ruben has become the most competent user of the planter, selling his services to quickly and accurately sow the fields of his neighbors – more than 11 acres of land this year – to earn an income. He is excited about the potential of the planter and is proud of his long-term inputs to the development of the improved tool. Across the region, acceptance of the planter is high and demand continues to grow. Based on demand, the East Africa Team is working to improve access to the Maresha planter across the region.

PERENNIAL VEGETABLES FOR HEALTH

Anemia and poor nutrition are an incredible challenge across East Africa. To combat this, the East Africa training team has focused specifically on health centers, equipping more than 2,000 individuals this year alone! Patients and their caretakers learn about the benefits and flavors of these nutritious leaves, and are given cuttings and seeds to multiply and share at home.

ROCKET STOVES

A rocket stove trainee named Gerryson was so inspired by the easy-to-produce rocket stove, he identified himself as a leader who would take the knowledge forward. "A few days after I received the training, I constructed my two rocket stoves as you

can see," Gerryson said while pointing to his stoves which he named 'double burner'. Because of ECHO's training, Gerryson is able to provide low-smoke, fuel-efficient stoves for others, especially older women in his village for less than five dollars each. Gerryson represents at least 150 farmers in five communities who have benefited from the rocket stove trainings this year.

TRAINING THE NEXT GENERATION

In partnership with 24 secondary schools in Tanzania, ECHO has trained thousands of future farmers in sustainable, creative ways to improve their nutrition and family livelihoods. Head Teacher at Orkeeswa Secondary School , Hosea Issaya shared, "We thank ECHO East Africa for providing us with these practices that have enabled us to harvest rainwater and produce nutritious perennial vegetables. Our food security has increased and the consumption of nutritious food at the school has been sustained for the past three years. Several students have taken these perennial vegetables to their homesteads."

THE GOSPEL AND AGRICULTURE

Your generous support has allowed the ECHO West Africa team to continue training in Bible institutes and schools across the region — equipping future pastors and their families to model holistic development and transformation to their communities. Trainees express their gratitude because, they say, this is the first time they have been taught the powerful and life-changing combination of agriculture and the Gospel.

IMMEDIATELY PUT INTO PRACTICE

Of the nearly 5,000 individuals trained across the region this year, on average, 84% of trainees put into practice at least two learned techniques immediately! Skills such as Foundations for Farming, homemade liquid fertilizer, and composting had an impact on their lives, their families, and their communities. Thanks to these techniques, families experienced significantly reduced expenses for

fertilizers, healthier crops, and larger harvests! Pastor Zacharie and his wife say they are "ready to phase out chemical fertilizer in favor of organic fertilizers, which are good for both our physical and financial health. This training has brought hope back to agriculture."

REGIONAL IMPACT

The West Africa training teams completed 70 trainings across five countries: Burkina Faso, Ghana, Mali, Togo, and Benin. These hands-on opportunities, coupled with intentional followup, mean that trainees learn practical knowledge, try skills, and also receive further training at the next visit.

INTERN DEVELOPMENT

Each year, eight exceptional young people join ECHO's Internship Program to gain hands-on experience in tropical agriculture and missions. Three of the recent intern graduates are now serving internationally with ECHO, either in Thailand or Senegal. These locations give the interns an opportunity to put into practice what they learned from ECHO, transferring theory and academic learning to "hands on" practical and contextual implementation through collaborating with a community of farmers and partners during trainings and field visits.

RESOURCING GLOBALLY

Through ECHOcommunity this year, 636 new Active Development Workers joined our online network to access agricultural resources, seeds, conversations, and ask specific questions. Each month, visitors from more than 200 countries utilize ECHO resources and connect with each other.

Through ECHOcommunity Conversations, 1,746 people logged in to respond to a topic or ask advice for their own work. One visitor, Beth from Zimbabwe, responded, "That is incredibly valuable...The issues are way too big not to share information. So thank you for what you're doing!"

Global Resourcing

Multiplying Impact is at the heart of ECHO's mission. Inherent to ECHO's model is the expectation that entrepreneurial farmers and partners resourced and trained by ECHO benefit their families and communities by multiplying the plants, agricultural practices, and appropriate technologies with which they are equipped. In the same vein, ECHO's network partners multiply ECHO's knowledge resources by sharing them with those who need them most.

Multiplication leverages impact by equipping others to be trainers, thus removing time and financial constraints to the spread of practical knowledge. Furthermore, because multiplication can be "caught" and "taught", a multiplication approach embeds and reinforces knowledge, while empowering those trained by ECHO to become multipliers themselves.




